Then, I made a decision that led to a government investigation. I didn't understand. I didn't know what to do or where to turn for guidance.

My lack of knowledge resulted in a series of bad decisions that led to charges for conspiracy to commit securities fraud, mail fraud, and wire fraud.

A federal judge sentenced me to serve 18 months. That conviction led to the loss of my livelihood, and to my loss of hope.

When I surrendered to prison, I met Michael Santos. We became friends. While I was new to prison, Michael had been incarcerated for longer than 20 years.

The Department of Justice offers guidance on how executives can qualify for non-prosecution or deferredprosecution agreements. Sadly, Sam never knew about that process and neither did his lawyer. Sam deluded himself into believing that he'd receive a fine, probation, or home confinement. Not knowing how to prepare for sentencing, Sam showed up in his best suit and crossed his fingers. His family sat in the courtroom as the judge scolded Sam for his utter lack of preparation. When the gavel came down, the judge sentenced Sam to the maximum term: 60 months in federal prison. Federal marshals handcuffed Sam and led him away. Sam's family reached out to White Collar Advice for help. The WCA team coached Sam through the next steps. The result: Sam transitioned to home confinement after serving 22 months at the federal prison camp. Immediately, he joined our team. Now Sam uses his experience to help people avoid his mistakes and achieve a better outcome.

While studying at Columbia Law School, Lawrence "Larry" Hartman served as an editor for the Columbia Business Law Review. Northeast Regional Psychology Services Administrator for 17
years. In this position he supervised over 200 mental health
professionals, including doctoral level psychologists and
masters-level therapists providing psychological services in 18
federal prisons.

In 2008, Brad Rouse pleaded guilty to a drug conspiracy charge and spent one year at the Metropolitan Detention Center (MDC) in Brooklyn. After his release, Brad started speaking about trauma, addiction recovery, and jail in New York City venues including the John Jay College of Criminal Justice. Brad first met Michael Santos through the Prison Professors podcast then started working for White Collar Advice in 2018. Today, Brad helps defendants, and their families prepare personal narratives and character reference letters prior to sentencing.

As an award-winning theater artist, Brad directed the world premiere of Billy Porter's one-man show at the Public Theater in New York City. Brad's stage work, featured on CBS (60 Minutes II) and NPR (All Things Considered), included premieres by multiple Tony, Drama Desk, Emmy, and Golden Globe winners and nominees.
